For Once, Then, Something Robert Frost

What significance do you think these choices by the author have? How is the poem structured in terms of lines and stanzas? Does this structure seem to have any particular significance?

What does the author's use of the phrase "for once" imply? Why do you think the word "once" is italicized in line 7?

Why do you think the author uses the vague word "something" in the title?

What can we infer from the poem about the narrator's character and personality? What do lines 4-5 indicate about people's usual state of mind?

What literary device is used in line 11, and what is the narrator implying by describing the water in this way?

Why do you think the narrator juxtaposes "truth" and "a pebble of quartz" in line 15?

What does the well symbolize in the poem? What does light symbolize? What does it mean that the narrator is "wrong to the light" (line 2)?
